Certificates Available

At present three certificates are available for students in the Academy. Students may earn a certificate in *Supported Community Employment*, *Supported Community Living* and/or *Supported Community Access*. Each certificate has approximately 20 credits of coursework. Students may take all or any combination of the three certificates.

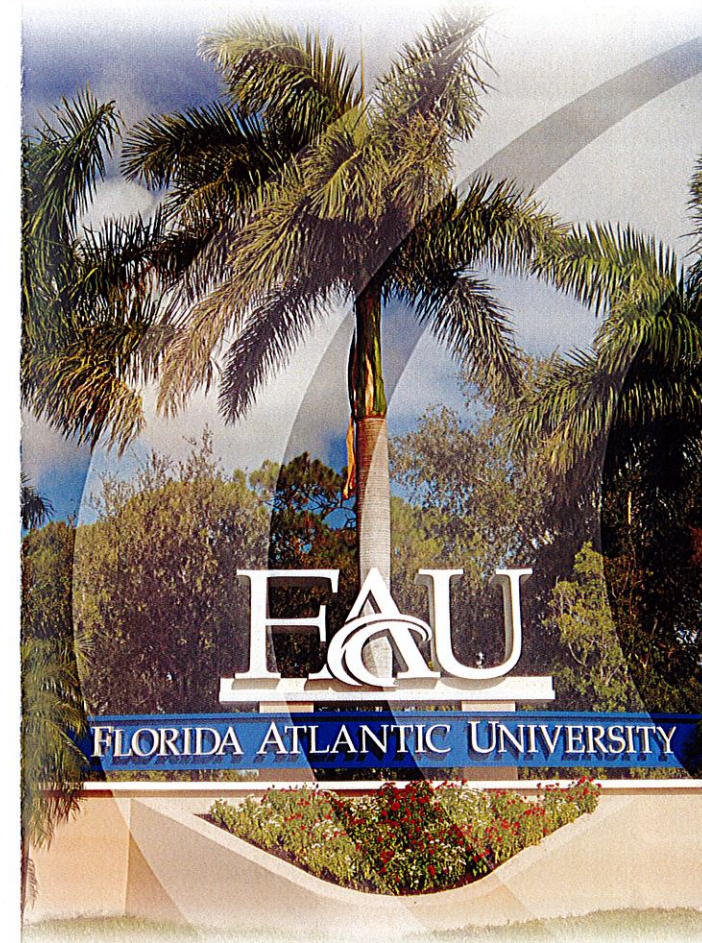

To Apply Applicants Must:

- Have a documented intellectual and developmental disability
- Be 18 years of age or older
- Have completed high school
- Meet personal needs without assistance
- Be able to self-administer necessary medication
